LIGHT AWARDS PROGRAM: Overview

- LIGHT supports teachers by:
 - Making grants to teams of teachers
 - Empowering them to identify and participate in professional development opportunities of their choice
 - Connecting them to a network of other motivated educators
- LIGHT makes grants of up to \$30,000 over two years





LIGHT AWARDS PROGRAM: Requirements

- Participation in an annual gathering of awardees
- Production of a shareable finalproduct at the end of the project
- ✓ Submission of annual narrative and financial reporting on project progress, learnings, challenges and expenditures
- Participation in an alumni network
- ✓ Hosting an annual site visit of IPF Board Members







LIGHT AWARDS PROGRAM: Criteria & Eligibility

LIGHT supports teacher participation in experiences that fulfill one or more of the following criteria:

- ✓ Renew educators' passion for and commitment to teaching
- ✓ Demonstrate relevance for teachers, schools and/or beyond
- ✓ Have the potential to have school-wide, district-wide and/or system-wide impact
- ✓ Enhance teacher leadership skills





LIGHT AWARDS PROGRAM: Criteria & Eligibility

Projects that are ineligible for funding include:

- **×** One-time events
- **X** Travel outside of the U.S.
- ★ Grants to solely purchase technology equipment and/or classroom supplies





LIGHT AWARDS PROGRAM: Criteria & Eligibility

- ✓ Team Size: 3-6 teachers (including one designated Team Leader).
- ✓ Type of School(s): traditional public or charter schools
- ✓ Counties: Alameda, Marin, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz
- ✓ Team Member Experience: minimum of two years of full-time, classroom teaching experience
- ✓ **Endorsement**: project has support from the principal from each participating school





GRANT RECIPIENT ENTITY

The LIGHT Awards makes grants to tax-exempt entities, including:

- > Schools
- School districts
- School foundation
- School-related nonprofits





LIGHT AWARDS PROGRAM: Developing a Project

Brainstorming Questions

- What have I always wanted to learn about and pursue, but never had the funding to do so?
- What is a project that would empower teachers to meet students' needs?
- What project would interest many of my colleagues? What do my colleagues on the team want to learn most?
- What project can my school district and principal support?
- If I could learn something to enhance my teaching career, what would it be?





LIGHT AWARDS PROGRAM: Developing a Project

Project Examples

- Project Based Learning (PBL) at the Buck Institute: Send a team of teachers to summer workshops at the Buck Institute for Education who will then develop best practices, lessons and activities related to PBL to bring back to their school site and implement throughout the school year.
- Yale Center for Emotional Intelligence to train team members in how to utilize the RULER (Recognizing, Understanding, Labeling, Expressing and Regulating emotions) system in their school.

- 1. Via the Apply Now button on the website, **Team registers an account** with the LIGHT Awards grant management system (Foundant)
- 2. Team completes and submits Letter of Intent (LOI)
- LIGHT Awards staff reviews LOI to ensure team and project idea meet the established criteria
- 4. Team's LOI is approved and the Team is given access to the Application
- 5. Team completes and submits Application
- LIGHT Awards staff reviews Application, submits any questions or comments to Team
- 7. Team submits responses or updates Application if requested





LIGHT Awards Program Application Profess

In order to access the application form for the LIGHT Awards Program, your team must submit a Letter of Intent (LOI) to verify your eligibility. Please click on the link below to access the LOI form. Once it has been submitted, you will be notified via email if you have been approved to apply for the award.

LIGHT Awards Program 2015

Both the LOI and Application forms will refer to a Lead Teacher, School and Principal. Please refer to the following definitions:

Lead Teacher: Each applicant team must consist of three to six full-time teachers. One of those team members will need to assume the role of Lead Teacher. The Lead Teacher is the LIGHT Awards Program main point of contact and is responsible for stewarding the application and project.


Lead School: Some applicants will consist of team members all from the same school. In that case, their school is the Lead School. Some applicants will consist of team members from multiple schools. In that case, the Lead School should be the school of the Lead Teacher.

Lead Principal: Some applicants will consist of team members all from the same school. In that case, their school principal is the Lead Principal. Some applicants will consist of team members from multiple schools. In that case, the Lead Principal should be the principal of the Lead Teacher. In the case of multiple schools, a letter of support will be required from the principal at each participating teacher's school.

A completed Application will include the following:

- ✓ Full applicant profile information (includes Team Leader, Lead School, Lead Principal, Grant Recipient Entity, and Additional Team Member information)
- ✓ Narrative
- ✓ Proposed timeline
- ✓ Proposed budget (and budget narrative, if necessary)
- ✓ Signed Principal Letter of Support
- ✓ Signatures from all Team Members









Although the system automatically saves your work approximately every 20 minutes, we highly recommend manually saving your work whenever you feel you have completed a significant portion of the LOI or Application!







SELECTION PROCESS

- The LIGHT Awards is a competitive grants program
- Completed applications will be reviewed by the Intrepid Philanthropy Foundation Board, Advisory Board and education experts
- The LIGHT Awards highly values innovation, collaboration and measurable impact, and will rate applications based on these factors
